Guilty! Yes, I do buy into the Academy Awards hype each year. Do I get a pass if I say that I'm a bona fide cinephile? Speaking of which, the 97th Awards ceremony is scheduled for this Sunday at 4 pm. As always, the nominations showcase a diverse array of films contending for Best Picture. For me, it helps to sift through the hundreds of new films each year and refine my choices about how to spend those hours in front of the big as well as small screen. Having seen all ten Best Picture nominees, I can state that they not only exemplify cinematic excellence but also delve into pressing social issues and themes. Here's my overview of each nominated film and the topics they explore.

<u>Emilia Pérez</u> is a Spanish-language film with a narrative that centers on a Mexican drug lord who undergoes gender transition, aiming to escape his criminal past and seek redemption. The film addresses themes of identity, transformation, and the quest for personal redemption. <u>The Brutalist follows László Toth</u>, a visionary Hungarian architect who emigrates to post-WW II America. The film explores themes of immigration, the pursuit of the American Dream, and the personal and professional challenges faced by immigrants striving to rebuild their lives in a new land. <u>Wicked</u> is a musical fantasy adaptation that reimagines the backstory of the witches from the Land of Oz. The sequel to the epic science fiction saga, <u>Dune: Part Two</u> continues the story of political intrigue, environmental exploitation, and colonialism on the desert planet of Arrakis.
